Stress was one of the last things accelerated students needed to deal with. When Jamie Mundy

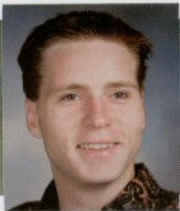
had a term paper due, a test in one class, and a "hundred" college algebra problems due the next day, she commented on her stress level. "I was pulling out my hair in frustration."

Do you remember when you were a freshmen, and it seemed like it would take forever to be a senior and get to do the things seniors did? Well, you finally made it, and the privileges were yours.

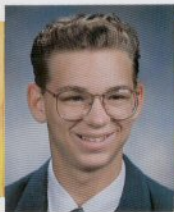
National Honor Society, a club for academically superior seniors, was considered a privilege to some. Of course, the first choice of parking spaces
