Students And Teachers Evaluate Semester Exams

Every year about the same time, the second grading quarter draws to an end, which brings about the question of semester exams.

Most students and some teachers have now reached the point of questioning the validity of semester exams.

Some of the teachers here at Lanphier feel that the semester exams provide a third grade to average in better. Miss Cynthia Luton, Mr. Robert Wylder and Mr. Gary Wilhoit agree with this. Other teachers such as Mrs. Marian Hopper, Mr. Ray Bruzan and Mr. John Watkins feel a student should have an opportunity to refuse taking semester exams with the teacher's approval. Mrs. Laverne Holtman has her own opinion to "put it all together" on some courses and it helps, but on typing it has no meaning. Mrs. Leona Garrison says "Everyday is an exam" and "you shouldn't grade just by final exams." Miss Inez Gieseking thinks there is no reason why everyone

has to cram all in one night for an exam. Mr. T. W. Babcock also gave an opinion which was, "There's a place for them."

Students of Lanphier in the junior and senior category were then asked the question "What do you think of semester exams?" Over 50% of the students asked said exams were "too hard," "rotten," and other comments against exams. Only about 20% to 30% of the people questioned agreed with the teachers, on the exams helping decide what their grade would be if they had been on a border line.



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
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
Students, Teachers Comment On Pass-Fail System

The pass-fail system, what is it? This system, which is not very widely used, grades students on an either-you-do-or-you-don't pass idea. Either the student does well enough to get the pass grade or he doesn't; there's no in between. Some teachers at LHS feel negatively about this sytem.

Miss Rowland said that this system would be more acceptable in college than in high school but that it would be good in subjects that are required, such as U.S. history or government. Miss Rowland, along with other teachers, stated that there would be no incentive to learn and that students would study just enough to pass.

Mr. Clay indicated that there is no distinction be-





tween the A and the D student, but he also thought this system would be okay in some subjects.

The comment came from Miss Jeske that the system was too vague and that some students want to know what they rate.

A view different from all of these came from Mrs. Taylor. She said the system was good, because, for one reason "I don't believe in grades." She also pointed out that under our present A-B-C-D-E system, students work for grades instead of working to learn. Under the passfail system, students wouldn't feel pressure by parents or class rank.

How do students feel about this system?

Linda Peterson thought that it wouldn't give an employer a very good idea of how well a person does. Larry Swanner said that to get into college, most everything is decided on class rank and there wouldn't be just trying to get by instead of doing their best.

Pam Cantrall said that if she passed, she'd like to know how much she passed by.

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Mark Pierce stated that he didn't like the pass-fail system because you would-n't work as hard; but on the A-B-C-D-E scale kids would work harder just to

get a better grade.

Both sides of the story have now been presented. And it seems as though most are satisfied with our present grading system.


'Twas The Day Before Finals





Girls Basketball Teams Undefeated After Two Matches


The LHS Girls Basketball teams had their first wins on Dec. 7 against Sacred Heart Academy.

Individual winners for the Lions were: Robert "Funchamp" Dennison, 167 lbs., first place. Robert pinned all three of his opponents in winning the title for the second consecutive year. Mark Cowden, 132 lbs., first place. Mark remains undefeated

after 11 matches. Khanki Barbour HWT finished second after he dropped his first match in eleven decisions. Don Williams, 105 lbs., ran his record to 9-2 in capturing third place. Don Cowden, 98 lbs., 4th place; his record is 8-4.

The Jacksonville Crimson will provide the evening of entertainment as their Capital Conference foes when the Lanphier Lions square off in the Lanphier gym on January 19. The Crimsons, eliminated last spring in sectional play by a scant point to Quincy, have thoughts of contending for the Conference crown. while Lanphier, who's had its up and downs during the campaign and a victory could give them a big boost to open the City Tournament on, only a week away.

Playing time has been evenly divided between a crop of candidates this season and there is no basic lineup in which to build on. Larry Hatchett, Randy Johnson, Russ Hayes, Rick Mitchell, and Al Klunick have all seen action when the episode is presented. Center Gary Roach and guard Greg Finigan have

been the only two actually hanging in there consistently for the greater percentage of every game. James Robinson and Mike Jasmon haven't played all that much but both played excessive amounts of time in some recent games, in particular at Glenwood.

The City Tournament is balanced off this year with Southeast back with the pack, Griffin keeping in steady pace and Springfield the most improved team in the area. It's possible that the Lions, playing a consistent 32 minutes of basketball, could come up with victories over the Spartans and Cyclones. But, the Springfield Senators, with height and strength up front, will be a tough nut to crack. The old cliche "one at a time" fits this year's City Tournament beautifully.

LHS Cagers Dealt Two Defeats

The Lions suffered two defeats in conference play last weekend. The first was to Decatur MacArthur who proved their record to 6-5. Lanphier led at the end of the first quarter 9-8, but that was the last time the Lions led. The final score of the game was 65-41 in favor of the Generals.

The Lions were dealt

Individual best times will be in the 200 and 400 yard

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
